IVF Treatment in the East of England

Your questions answered



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This leaflet explains what IVF treatment is, who qualifies for it in the east of England and where to find further information.

In Vitro Fertilisation (IVF) is one of a range of treatments for infertility. It is usually offered to patients only after other standard treatments have been considered.

What is IVF?

IVF is where a woman's eggs are collected and fertilised with her partner's sperm (or donated sperm) in a laboratory.

A fertilised egg (embryo) is then put into her womb and if it implants, then she becomes pregnant. IVF treatment is suitable for couples with various causes of infertility including blocked fallopian tubes or where other treatments such as fertility drugs have been unsuccessful.

Do my partner and I qualify for IVF treatment?



IVF treatment is provided on the NHS when couples have a medical reason for being unable to conceive a child.

Your doctor will be able to answer any questions you have about infertility and refer you to your local gynaecology clinic for investigations. If appropriate your NHS consultant will make the necessary referral to one of our 5 chosen IVF centres. **See over page for details.**

Couples living in the east of England need to have been registered with a GP in the region for a minimum of 12 months before being able to access IVF treatment. Below are some of the key criteria that couples would need to meet. A full list can be found on our website www.eoescg.nhs.uk

Criteria	
Age	Between 23 and 39 (female)
Body Mass Index (BMI)	Between 19 and 30 (female)
Previous sterilisation	Couples are not eligible if either partner has had previous sterilisation, even if it has been reversed
Previous IVF treatment	Will not preclude patients, but will be taken into account. In line with current clinical evidence couples should not undergo more than 5 fresh IVF cycles in total
Parental status	Couples should not have any children from their current relationship. This would include adopted children
Child welfare	Couples should conform to the statutory 'Welfare of the Child' requirements

These criteria aim to ensure the best possible IVF success rate for infertile couples in the east of England within the region's fertility treatment budget.

How often is IVF treatment successful?

IVF treatment is successful in around a fifth of cases nationally. Success rates vary depending on the couple involved.

When couples living in the east of England receive IVF treatment, only one embryo at a time is implanted in a woman's womb. This process is known as 'single embryo transfer'. To increase the chance of success women who qualify for IVF treatment can freeze and store any extra embryos they produce during their treatment cycle. This means that if their first embryo does not implant they may have additional 'tries' to conceive.

Are there any risks associated with IVF treatment?

Having a multiple birth (twins, triplets or more) is the greatest health risk associated with IVF. In the east of England the 'single embryo transfer' policy aims to reduce the likelihood of multiple births occurring through IVF treatment.

Your doctor will be able to discuss with you the health implications of seeking IVF treatment.



What IVF treatment is available in the east of England?

As from May 1, 2009, eligible couples living in the east of England have access to up to three fresh cycles of IVF treatment on the NHS, regardless of where they live in the region.
